## **ABOUT THE UPSTATE COC**

#### The Fight to End Homelessness

The Continuum of Care is a community of individuals and providers that coordinates and support the delivery of housing and services to individuals experiencing homelessness as they move to stable housing and maximum self-sufficiency.

The Upstate CoC is made up of more than 100 agencies taking action to end homelessness. Serving 13 counties in Upstate, SC, the Continuum of Care aims to prevent, reduce and end homelessness through the coordination of agencies in our communities.

The 13 counties that make up the CoC include Abbeville, Anderson, Cherokee, Edgefield, Greenville, Greenwood, Laurens, McCormick, Oconee, Pickens, Saluda, Spartanburg and Union. For a full list of participating agencies in these 13 counties please click here.

United Housing Connections coordinates the CoC's efforts throughout 13 counties in the Upstate and is the leading provider of services, as well as the collaborative applicant for the HUD CoC Program Grant. UHC is also the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) administrator for the region.

## **Strategic Priorities**



Our goal is to coordinate efforts to make homelessness brief, rare and nonrecurring in our service area through a holistic approach that addresses homeless prevention, homeless outreach, interim housing and shelter, and permanent housing.

Four Strategic Priorities are as follows:



#### Increase Low-Barrier Shelter/Housing Options

- Expand low-barrier day services
- Develop low-barrier interim housing and non-congregate shelter options
- Expand development of Supportive Housing for special populations
- Further explore the shared housing model



# Strengthen Coordinated Entry System

- Increase cross-sector public/private partnerships
- Work to create centralized Housing Resource Centers to coordinate available options for shelter and housing in all CoC Chapters
- Further expand Effective Zero Approach to identify system barriers



#### Support Efforts to Decriminalize Homelessness

- Work with local governments and courts to:
  - Engage and Educate on Best Practice Responses to homelessness
  - Partner in all aspects of service delivery: homeless prevention, outreach, shelter and housing
  - Provide a response system that includes initial intervention and diversion to prevent charges
  - Quick response in crisis situations
  - Support development/utilization of homeless court to prevent or expunge charges for eligible offenses



# Deploy Programs & Measure Outcomes through Equitable Lense

- Include a diverse group of individuals in marginalized, minority populations in decision making (people of color, LGBTQ+, Veterans, DV Survivors, Unaccompanied Youth, Disabled)
- Utilize the Peer Support Model of service delivery
- Use a "go-to" approach to meet the needs of persons experiencing homelessness

# Increase Low-Barrier Housing & Shelter Options

"This unprecedented rise in unsheltered homelessness—including visible encampments—is a direct result of a lack of accessible and low-barrier shelter options, insufficient supply of affordable housing, and voluntary service and support options. Deploying effective programs to meet their diverse needs takes unwavering commitment and unyielding creativity."

Encourage current Providers across the Continuum to explore expansion	Explore lower-cost models for interim housing - small, single-quarters with shared amenities	Explore grants and funding for rehab of older housing in rural areas to create shared housing options
Encourage current Providers across the continuum to explore lower-barrier program options	Develop more PSH for chronically homeless like Reedy and CSP for people with disabilities	Encourage the Rehab of abandoned facilities and schools to convert into shared housing
Develop additional low- barrier Day Shelter options that include targeted peer support and case management services with a focus on stable housing	Utilize Housing Resource Centers and CES to ensure which housing solutions are the best fits, using a "person-centered" approach	Identify and support homeless service providers in building a shared housing program

# Strengthen Coordinated Entry System

"Evaluate coordinated entry and provide tools and guidance on effective assessment processes that center equity, remove barriers, streamline access, and divert people from homelessness."

# **Develop Housing Resource Centers**

Centralize communication among the community and service providers to connect people in crisis to services through a single path

Centralize connection to multiple housing and shelter options in each CoC Chapter

Utilize call centers established in each CoC Chapter to receive housing support referrals

## Expand Effective Zero

Identify ways the CES process could be made more inclusive of programs outside of federal funding, removing barriers and increasing access

Ensure the CES Process includes a strong homeless prevention & diversion program to prevent chronic homelessness

# Engage Local Governments/Courts /Business Sectors

Utilize a "together approach" to problem solving

Build trust through open dialogue

Provide education on homeless engagement and response

# Partner in All Aspects of Service Delivery

Outreach - peer support, law enforcement - judicial system

Shelter services - low barrier and housing focused

Housing - encourage partnerships in the development of housing funds and incentive programs

Use a framework of service delivery to educate on homeless prevention, outreach, shelter, and housing models

# Utilize Best Practice Interventions

Outreach - Best Practice models include peer-support, behavioral health, and mental heath interventions

Developing and communicating engagement plans for those experiencing homelessness

Ensure persons
experiencing
homelessness have lowbarrier, accessible options
for service engagement

Support the development and utilization of homeless court to prevent or expunge minor charges for eligible offenses

Ensure those with lived-experience are at the table

Ensure people of color and marginalized populations have a clear voice

Foster space for open dialogue regarding culturally informed program development

# Utilize a Go-To Approach

Meet the person(s) where they are; don't become their problem solver rather their support in the future they want to create

Be willing to meet people in their own environment rather always having them come to you

If you are not sure if you have the knowledge to be culturally appropriate, examine if you are the right person for this particular interaction
